"WE ARE COMMUNITY" MURAL PROJECT



JP also held a masked and socially distanced community photoshoot outside of Grey Squirrel Coffee, capturing a diverse cross-section of our Carrboro neighbors. Several of the people photographed were included in the mural, along with places, activities, and things that people felt represented the spirit of our town and its many residents. The cover of our annual report features some of these photographs!

This mural project was made possible by support from Duke Energy, East Main Square, The Chamber for a Greater Chapel Hill-Carrboro, Carrboro Business Alliance, and the Orange County Arts Commission.

In the spring of 2020, The ArtsCenter launched a new Public Art Initiative to bring the arts to our community at a time when the COVID-19 pandemic made our normal in-person programming impossible. With the help of our neighbors, we selected Grey Squirrel Coffee as the site for our first ever mural project to celebrate the spirit, diversity and resilience of our Carrboro community.

A panel of local artists, educators, and community leaders reviewed over 20 applications from individual artists and artist teams and selected muralist Jermaine "JP" Powell to design and install the mural. JP and The ArtsCenter gathered feedback and suggestions from over 300 Carrboro residents through an online survey to find out what Carrboro means to our community.



A NOTE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR AND OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Thanks to continued community support, there is great optimism about the future of The ArtsCenter as we enter 2021. While the past 18 months have been very difficult on all in the world, we have used this time to recommit to our teachers, students and members.

As part of this recommitment, The ArtsCenter is focused on four key pillars, guiding all our efforts to achieve a more inclusive engagement with our community. The four pillars:

Community engagement: We are spending much effort listening with a very real intention to more actively engage all members of the community.

Diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI): Making inclusion of all, regardless of race, religion, or gender our first priority. The first objective is to pilot a program with the State that will utilize an outside consultant to audit our DEI practices and develop a plan for improvement.

Capital campaign: Raise enough money to build our new building on Jones Ferry Road. Working with the Town of Carrboro, we have been approved for our conditional use permit which opens the doors to begin construction late 1st quarter / early 2nd quarter 2022. To date we have raised over 50% of the needed funds.

Financial stability; continue the strong record of 6 straight years of operating in the 'black' by offering unique and inspiring youth classes, summer camp sessions, adult classes and performances.

All of these exciting opportunities have been made possible through the continued support from you, our community. We thank every one of you for this tremendous gift of support!


